<p>Course Description:</p> <p>This course explores social, economic, and political developments and events and their impact on the lives of different groups in Canada since 1914. Students will examine the role of conflict and cooperation in Canadian society, Canada’s evolving role within the global community, and the impact of various individuals, organizations, and events on Canadian identity, citizenship, and heritage. <p>1) Learning Skills & Work Habits: Students are evaluated on 6 Learning Skills & Work Habits. They are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Responsibility • Organization • Independent Work • Collaboration • Initiative • Self-Regulation 	<p>These six attributes are evaluated on a scale of Excellent (E), Good (G), Satisfactory (S) & Needs Improvement (N) and reported on the report card. They are not included in the course mark, unless specified in the curriculum expectations.</p>				
<p>2) Term Mark (Assessment of Learning): Student performance standards for knowledge and skills are described in the curriculum Achievement Chart. The curriculum is assessed in four categories:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Knowledge and Understanding 25% • Thinking and Inquiry 25% • Communication 25% • Application 25% 	<p>Evaluation of these four categories generates the term mark. The term mark accounts for 70% of the final mark.</p> <p>It is the student’s responsibility to submit evidence of learning.</p>				
<p>3) Final Evaluation (Assessment of Learning): The final evaluation, administered at or towards the end of the course is based on the evidence shown to the right. Unit	Description	Approximate Length	Major Unit Evaluation
Canada, 1914-1929	Students learn about the factors leading to World War One and the impact of the war on Canada.	{ 4 weeks }	Unit culminating assignment and test
Canada, 1929-1945	Students learn about the experiences of Canadians in the grip of economic and geopolitical forces. Students will learn about the atrocities of World War Two and about Canada's participation in the war.	{ 4 weeks }	Unit culminating assignment and test
Canada, 1945-1982	From the end of World War II to the 1980's, students will investigate the pursuit of security in a time of international challenge; social and economic changes within Canada's borders; and the continuing search for a Canadian identity	{ 3 weeks }	Unit culminating assignment and test
Canada, 1982 to the Present	Students will investigate some key social, economic, and political events, trends, and developments in Canada from 1982 to the present, and assess their significance for different groups in Canada	{ 3 weeks }	Unit culminating assignment and test
